The 299th meeting of the Pasadena Citizens' Advisory Council (PCAC) was held on Tuesday, April 25, 2023 at the City of Pasadena Emergency Operations Center, located in the Pasadena Police Department at 1201 Davis. Facilitator Diane Sheridan reviewed the agenda, which was accepted as proposed. The meeting notes from March 28, 2023 were approved without change. OVERVIEW OF PASADENA EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND TOUR OF CITY OF PASADENA EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER

City of Pasadena Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) Azell Carter, head of the city's Office of Emergency Management (OEM), provided an overview of emergency management in Pasadena and hosted a tour of the city's Frank Bengochea Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Carter also showed members the city's Dispatch Center where, for example, 911 calls are received and emergency services dispatched. Carter's last slide provides contact information for him and his deputy EMC, Andrew

Aleman.

The Pasadena EOC is a specially equipped facility where those with roles in emergency response and recovery gather face to face to manage a disaster. Perhaps the most impressive part of the city's newest EOC was the room-length video wall that includes 30 screens that each may be split into 4 screens. The late Frank Bengochea organized the effort to obtain a grant that funded the large display.

As shown in his slides, Carter described the OEM staff members, listed the OEM equipment, provided an overview of terms, and listed the risks and hazards for which the city must be prepared. The city will soon have a drone unit and a new mobile command trailer. The improvements to manage emergencies have been funded primarily by grants.

Carter listed the communications tools available to both receive and send information and showed the locations of the city's 12 sirens. Sirens now are tested each Saturday at noon as are the Deer Park and La Porte sirens. A review of the siren locations is underway as is an evaluation of which ones need to be rebuilt or replaced. The most effective locations are nowadays considered places where many people gather rather than along freeways.

Carter said that the city uses the community emergency communications protocols for plants and cities found in the East Harris County Manufacturers Association *Industry Incident Communications Handbook*. The city is part of the Southeast Regional Local Emergency Planning Committee (SERLEPC), which requires industrial facilities to use the e-Notify system to notify the city of industrial events. The city tracks the number of plants that conduct training to be sure they know how to use e-Notify. Plants should practice placing a message as if the facility lost power as well as when it does not.

Carter urged those who live, work, or play in Pasadena to sign up with *Ready Pasadena* to be able to receive alerts from the OEM.

He and Laura Mireles, the city's Public Information Officer, described the use of social media as well as the CAER Online app to provide both warnings and information. Mireles provided a summary of all of the city's communications resources as well as the city departments on social media (attached to notes).

A call to shelter in place for a chemical release would be made by the city and would involve the police and fire departments and the OEM. The plant with the event may *recommend* a shelter in place, but state law does not permit plants to *issue* one.

The EOC activates for any kind of hazard, not just a chemical release. That includes activating to manage a hurricane. Carter's showed evacuation routes in the greater Houston area as well as the 2023 evacuation zip-zone map. Authorities will issue evacuation orders based on zip code to make it easier for people to understand when they should leave. Evacuation calls are phased to let those closest to the coast to get out of the area first.
